
"I received an NICC Foundation scholarship and it assisted me greatly as a student working while going to school," Peyton said.

SETTING FUTURE STUDENTS UP FOR *success*

With rising economic costs all around us, students at Northeast Iowa Community College faced financial pressures this year as they worked to complete their education and training. From groceries and transportation to textbooks, these rising financial costs can make or break a student's budget.

Offsetting school and life costs through scholarships, made possible by donors like you, set students up for success. This past year, your support aided the NICC Foundation in awarding \$383,729 in scholarships to students in need. Out of the 770 students who applied for scholarships, 440 received an award, with an average scholarship award size of \$713.23.

One scholarship recipient, Lanie Morris, received the NICC 1966 Scholarship and is one step closer to her career goal of becoming a nurse because of your support.

"I deeply appreciate the support and opportunity provided by generous donors. This scholarship will help me pursue my dream career and relieve some financial burdens during the process. I can focus on my degree, rather than working to afford the payments," Lanie said.

Scholarships are such an important piece of student success at the College. In fact, **89% of NICC scholarship recipients successfully complete their degrees.**

As the scholarship program has continued to grow at NICC, many donors have opted to create future opportunities for NICC students through the creation of annual scholarships that will later be funded to endowed levels through planned giving. Donors like Barry and Kathy Bromberg understand the challenges students face and have pledged to support students' education through an annual or planned gift.

"We understand the financial challenges of getting a college education, especially for the nontraditional student. There are many expenses, besides paying for tuition, that can cause a student to drop out of school.

We wanted to donate now, through the Student Support Scholarship, so today's students can better their lives and begin a better future. We also wanted to donate through our Endowment Fund upon our deaths, so that future generations will also receive the benefit of a higher education," the Brombergs said.

Vouchers Received: Book Purchases Await!

On May 15, NICC participated in Great Give Day, a 24-hour online giving day hosted by the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque. This year, NICC chose to raise funds for a Book Voucher program launching in August 2024.

While the College strives to provide as many free educational resources as possible, many classes still require book or material purchases. This year, the average cost of one book was \$91.60. In fact, a financial wellness survey completed at the College last fall indicated 41% of student respondents stated that textbooks were not affordable.

Randy Mashek, Director of Financial Aid at NICC, shared, "A student's access to funding is our priority. Paying for textbooks is an indirect cost that students sometimes overlook until the time comes to order them. Also, many students often decide to enroll close to the start of the semester, and timing is critical to get the student enrolled and textbooks ordered to have all materials on time."

By "vouching" for our students, you helped remove a barrier and set them up for a successful semester.

Together, you raised \$8,375 in less than 24 hours!
